## Musical Vocabulary

**Canon** - A canon is piece (of voices or instruments) that sing or play the same music starting at different times.

**Largo** - The word largo is a musical tempo meaning relatively slowly (40-60 bpm).

**Moderato** - Play at a moderate pace (105 bpm).

**Ostinato** - An ostinato is a melodic phrase that is repeated throughout a musical piece.

**Pedal** - A pedal is a single note that is held while the music continues.

## Curriculum areas of study:

**Pulse** - The pupils will explore the time signatures of 2/4 and 4/4 using three contrasting tempos with syncopation within the piece.

**Rhythm** - Pupils will explore the concept of syncopation further by using dotted rhythms within the time signature is 2/4 & 4/4 exploring tempi too.
